Dear parents and carers,

I am writing to update you on a number of important forthcoming dates for Year 12.

Year 12 progress and parents' evening

On Thursday 5th May, it is our virtual parents' consultation evening, when you will have the chance to discuss your child's progress with subject teachers. You will have received a separate letter with details about how to book appointments for this from Mr Parker.

On Thursday 5th, you should also be able to view a document for Year 12 students on Edulink which gives you information regarding your child's progress on their courses. This document includes:

- **Learning Indicators** which show students' levels of organisation, homework and class effort (please find full detail of what these mean at the end of this letter)
- Target grades: each student is set both a Minimum Target Grade and an Aspirational Target Grade, in line with how we now set targets in Years 7-11. The Minimum Target Grade is based on the performance of similar students' progress from GCSE compared to the top 20% of schools nationally, and the Aspirational Target Grade is based on similar students' progress from GCSE compared with the top 5% of schools nationally. Both targets are therefore challenging but achievable, and, in some cases, will equate to the same target grade being set for both Minimum and Aspirational targets.
- Assessment grades: these are the grades achieved in the most recent assessment¹
- 'Current working at' grades: these grades take into account all work completed on the course to date. At this point in Year 12, we would not necessarily expect to see a direct correlation between the target grades and 'current working at' grades, as only part of the course has been studied and our target grades have challenge built into them. Where we have any concerns about student progress, we will be working directly with the students and informing parents of this.

Future Pathways

I would also like to update you on what we will be covering in PSHE over the coming term. At The Sixth Form at Northampton School for Girls we aim to offer our students comprehensive advice and guidance about their options post-18. Our *Future Pathways* programme is designed to inform our students about university applications and higher education, apprenticeships, careers and employment. Students making early entries for Oxbridge or Medicine, Veterinary Medicine or Dentistry also receive specialist support with their applications.

Throughout the *Future Pathways* programme all students will receive a series of lessons covering university applications, advice on choosing a course and institutions, student finance as well as apprenticeships and non-university options post-18. All materials used in school, as well as additional materials to support students, will be available through a dedicated Future Pathways Google Classroom.

- Work is not always handed in on time.
- Work is not completed to an appropriate standard.
- Often tells teacher about problems on day of deadline.

- Less than 4 hours of work per week completed outside of lesson.
- Negative/complacent attitude to learning.
- Attendance and punctuality poor.
- Distracts the learning of others.
