- Language skills make you more employable, but Spanish even more so, as it's so widely spoken. Many British and American companies conduct business in Spanish-speaking countries, and with over 30 million Spanish speakers in the US alone, it's a great skill to have. Besides, employees with more language skills earn more on average.
- Learning Spanish will give you the opportunity to work and travel in Europe, Central and South America, and other Spanish-speaking countries (that includes taking a gap year in any Spanish-speaking country across the world).
- South America is a huge agricultural producer. Similarly, in Spain, the manufacturing and textile industries are strong so being able to speak Spanish could open up opportunities to work for global export companies.
