
Ethics and Philosophy (EP) GCSE

Why choose EP at GCSE?



EP is an academic subject that is well regarded at top universities. Below are three professions that hold EP in high regard and their reasons for doing so.

- Medicine: Medics make decisions based on ethical principles every day.
- Public services (police/prison officer/firefighter/teacher): Having a good awareness of cultural and religious diversity will help you deal with the public.
- Politics/law: Critical analysis and debating skills are invaluable in these areas.

In GCSE EP two religions are studied in depth; Christianity and Buddhism. These have been chosen because they are quite different (there is no God in Buddhism) and students seldom get confused between the two.

Please find the order of study below. Careful consideration has been given to the order in which the themes are taught. Issues such as abortion and euthanasia are taught in Year 11.






