Drama develops **creativity**, **confidence**, and **communication**, essential skills for many careers and further study in the arts, media, and beyond.

Course Overview and structure.

AQA GCSE Drama – Course Overview

Component One: Understanding Drama (40%) – Written Exam (1hr 45m)

- Study a set play and theatre roles (e.g., director, designer).
- Analyse and evaluate a **live theatre performance**.

Component Two: Devising Drama (40%) – Practical & Coursework

- Create and perform an original piece based on a stimulus.
- Complete a **Devising Log** reflecting on the process.

Component Three: Texts in Practice (20%) – Performance

- Perform two extracts from a published play.
- Assessed by an external examiner.



Assessment

GCSE Drama, Graded: 1-9

Modes of Assessment in GCSE Drama (AQA)

Written Exam (40%) – Component One

- 1 hour 45-minute exam.
- Multiple-choice questions on theatre roles.
- Analysis of a **set play** from the perspective of a **performer**, **designer**, **and director**.
- Evaluation of a **live theatre performance**.

Practical Performance & Coursework (40%) – Component Two

- Devised performance (original theatre piece).
- Choose to be a performer or designer (lighting, sound, set, costume).
- Devising Log (written reflection on process & performance).
- Internally assessed, externally moderated.

Practical Performance (20%) – Component Three

- Perform **two key extracts** from a published play.
- Choose to be a performer or designer.
- Assessed by an external examiner.





Drama Component One

GCSE Drama AQA Component Two: Performance from Text

• Rehearsal:

 Students are given a scripted play to work on. They rehearse a selected extract, focusing on character development, interpretation, and performance techniques.

• Performance:

 Students perform the chosen scene(s) from the play in front of an audience.

Textual Understanding:

 Students demonstrate their understanding of the play, character motivations, themes, and context through their performance.

Skills Developed:

Acting skills, character analysis, interpretation, and stagecraft.







Drama Component Two

GCSE Drama AQA Devised Drama

Stimulus:

 Students are given a stimulus (text, image, music, etc.) to inspire the creation of an original performance.

Devising Process:

 Students work collaboratively to develop characters, themes, and ideas. They experiment with different techniques like improvisation, physical theatre, and role-play.

• Final Performance:

 Students present their devised piece to an audience in any style or genre, reflecting the creative development from the stimulus.

Portfolio:

 A written document that outlines the research, development, and evaluation of the devised work, showing the process behind the performance.

Skills Developed:

Creativity, collaboration, critical thinking, and reflective analysis.



Drama Component Three

Component Three: Texts in Practice (20%) – Practical Performance

Overview:

- Students perform two key extracts from a published play.
- They can choose to be a performer or designer (lighting, sound, set, or costume).
- The focus is on interpretation, creativity, and communication of the script.

Performers will:

- Develop characterisation through voice, movement, facial expression, and staging.
- Apply skills learned throughout the course to bring their character to life.

Designers will:

- Create an effective theatrical design concept for the extracts.
- Use elements like **lighting**, **sound**, **set**, **and costume** to enhance storytelling.
- Present their design choices to communicate themes and emotions.





Key Career Skills
