The course

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Where can French take you?

- **Translation and Interpretation**: become a translator or interpreter, helping bridge language gaps in various industries such as healthcare, law, and international organizations.
- Diplomacy and International Relations: work in diplomatic services or international organisations, where proficiency in French is often valued.
- **Tourism and Hospitality**: pursue a career in the tourism and hospitality industry, working as a tour guide, travel agent, or in hotel management, especially in French-speaking regions.
- **Business and Commerce**: use your language skills in the business world by working for multinational companies, engaging in international trade, or becoming a liaison for companies doing business with French-speaking countries.
- Media and Communications: work in journalism, broadcasting, or digital media, where bilingual
 professionals are sought after to cover international news, conduct interviews, or create content for
 diverse audiences.
- **Nonprofit and NGOs**: join international nonprofits and non-governmental organisations. French is often a valuable asset in organisations dealing with development, humanitarian aid, and human rights.
