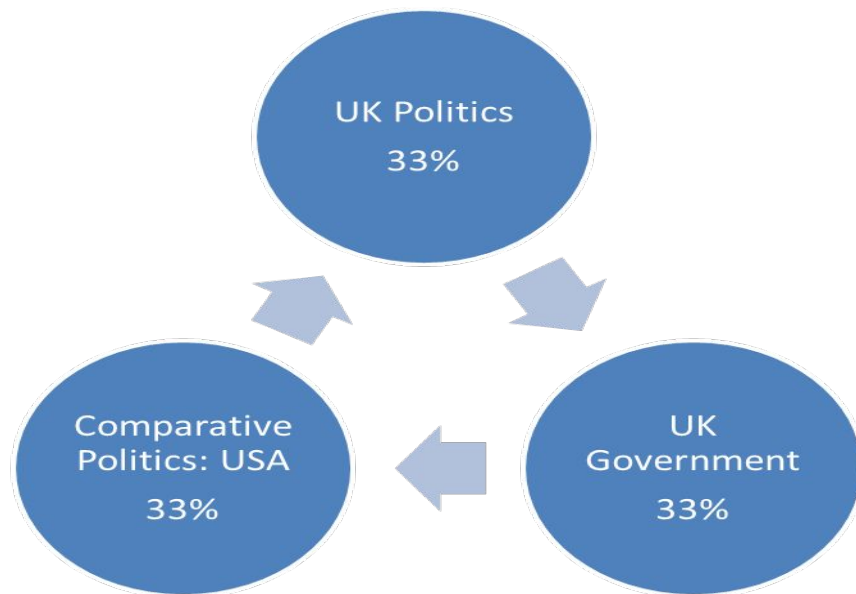

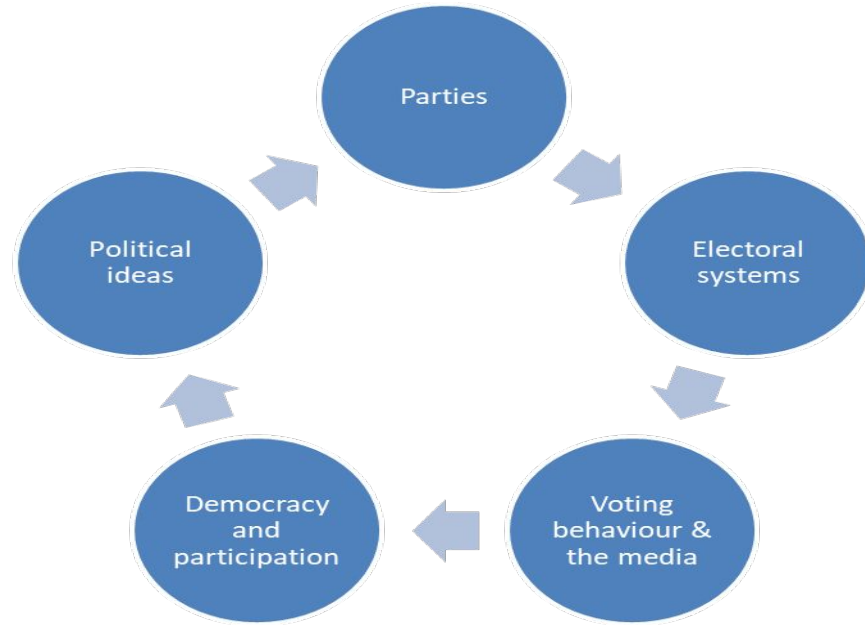

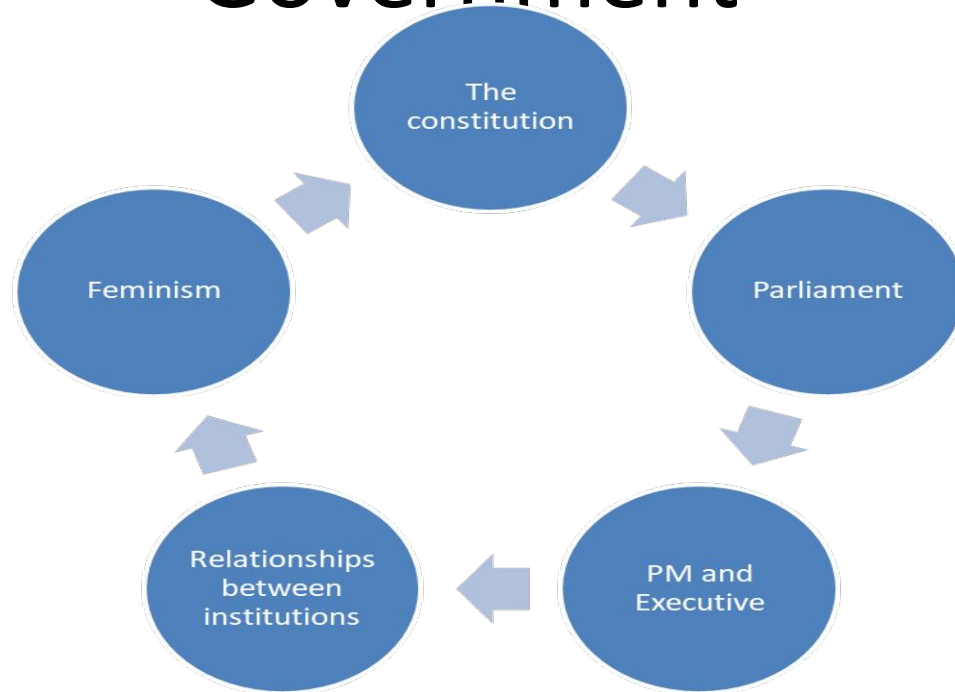
The structure of the course



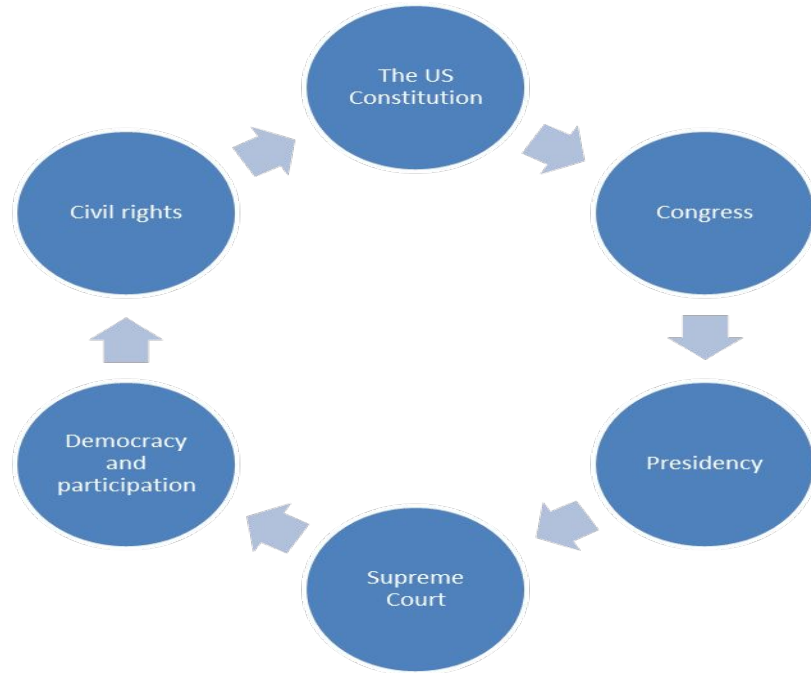
Component 1: UK Politics.....

Now for some course content....

- The UK is the only nation in the world that does not have a written **CONSTITUTION**
- So in the UK the rules are made in our **PARLIAMENT** (the oldest in the world)
- This is made up of 650 MPs, 800 Lords and the Queen
- Parliament 'watches over the government'
- All law is made in Parliament
- The USA has a written constitution and a president instead of a monarch. In the USA the judges are much more powerful than they are in the UK

Was the 2019 Euro election the end of two-party dominance?

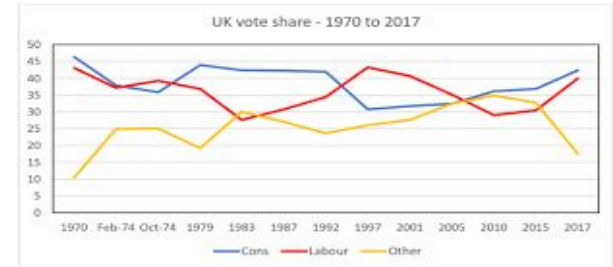
The local elections were disastrous for the two main parties

But, 2017 produced the

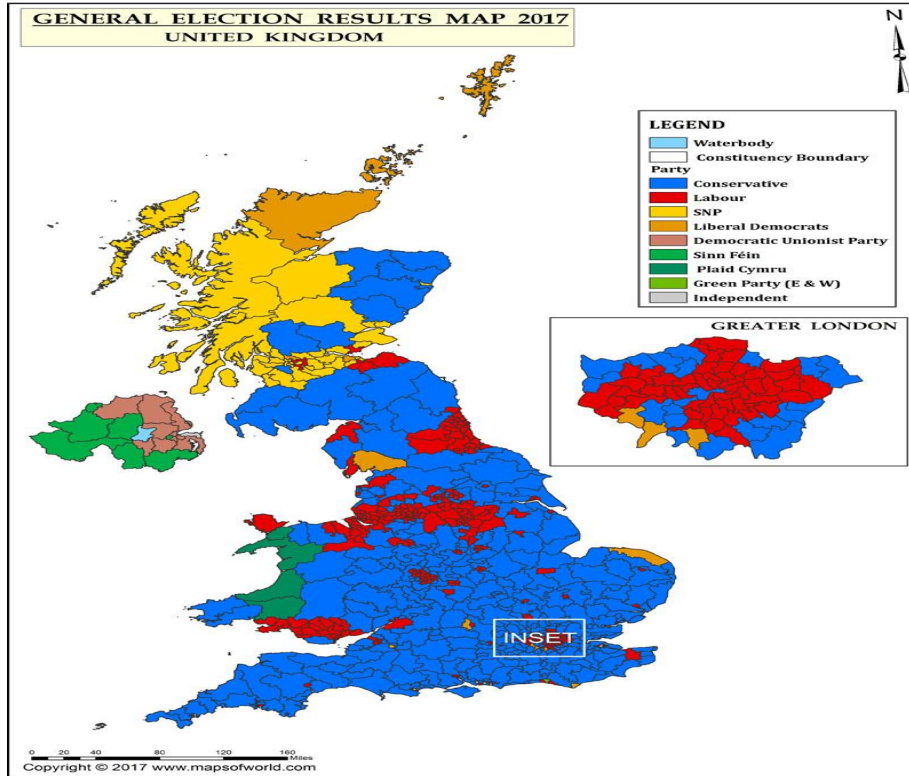
biggest vote share for the two main parties for years
